GEMBOREE REPORT

The morning fog snaked lazily into the Lithgow Valley and Colin Wright was already on the go as the first of the committee arrived to begin the task of setting up for the GEMBOREE 2017, the 53rd National Gem & Mineral Show. The mammoth event was staged by the Gem & Lapidary Council of NSW Inc. under the auspices of the Australian Federation of Lapidary & Allied Crafts Association Inc. The event was attracting a great amount of interest in Lithgow. Some of the various gem and lapidary clubs from around New South Wales assisted with organising and coordinating the various aspects of this mammoth event that was set to draw a large crowd of lapidaries and hobbyists, as well as the general public. The Show was the culmination of some three years of planning, meetings, deadlines, negotiations, bookings, phonecalls and emails, judging, travelling numerous times to Lithgow and many other jobs.

To see the empty halls transform into all the setting up, dealers laying out their displays, the near one thousand competition items laid out in their illuminated display cases after being judged, was the realisation that the GEMBOREE 2017 had finally commenced. Many of the public commented that they did not realise the variety of items that could be produced in lapidary work.

The unique trophies for the 53rd Gem and Mineral Show were commenced early and proved to be a somewhat complicated and time consuming job, but very worthwhile. After the GEMBOREE 2011 held at Bathurst, which received almost 1300 competitive entries, the 2017 committee decided that it would start early on trophies and try to make them distinctly something relevant to New South Wales as had been suggested in 2011, but it was too late to implement the plan then. At the time the pinkish to red Rhodonite was suggested. The 2017 Competition Committee wisely got onto the design and manufacture early.

After approaching a supplier of Rhodonite to no avail the NSW Gem and Lapidary Council decided to use the skills and resources within the various NSW lapidary clubs. Sourcing suitable Rhodonite initially was a problem until a substantial donation of the material from the Northern Districts Lapidary Club Committee was forthcoming. This was later polished on a vibralap, taking some weeks, working 24 hours a day. As polished pieces were completed, Nelson Robertson etched and coloured the outline of the map of NSW onto the Rhodonite. Then the slabs went back to have slots cut in its base as each Rhodonite slab was a slightly different size. Finally forty Rhodonite trophies were produced, thanks to a lot of work by a lot of people and clubs over a long time.

The Mayor of Lithgow, Ald Stephen Lesslie, admired the quantity, quality and varied nature of the competitive entries. He was also impressed with the sheer size

of the event and the number of people who had come to Lithgow and the Show. The Official Opening took place on the front steps of the main hall at 10am on Good Friday where the Mayor complimented the 2017 Committee on the event before opening the 53rd National Gem & Mineral Show.

Like all events, such as the GEMBOREE 2017, a great deal goes on basically unnoticed. As happens at all large occasions at the Lithgow Showground, parking is an issue and nearby sportsfields are turned in car parks. This means volunteers to do car parking and directing the public to the front entrance gate with more volunteers to collect the entry fees. Council barricades had been moved into place to control the flow of pedestrians

and cars, the latter being restricted within the grounds, except to those with Mobility Parking Scheme card. Those who had pre-registered to attend had a nominated parking spot on the grounds. As soon as the gates opened on Good Friday the public flowed in with over 4000 visiting. The volunteers on the gate were kept on their toes most of the day.



On the Saturday six busloads of lapidarists and other interested hobbyists and collectors arrived. It was a great idea to make the driving easy and relaxing as one travelled to Lithgow by bus. The Illawarra Lapidary Club, Bankstown Lapidary Club and the Northern District Lapidary Club members enjoyed the day looking around and picking up the items and specimens they required. The other three buses were from Canberra. There was another busload that arrived on Sunday looking for beads and jewellery making items.

The professional dealers numbered twenty in the main hall with all putting on a great display of material and showing the general public what is being found around Australia and the world at this time. With just a quarter of the various sellers indoors, the rest were outdoors and spread around the football sporting oval behind the main hall.

It was up early each morning to travel to Lithgow for the Bathurst Stamp, Coin, Collectables and Lapidary Club members who had volunteered to assist with the tailgating setup and management over the four days. With 65 marked out tailgating spaces on the oval, the tailgating proved to be quite popular with the public.

There was a good variety of material concentrated along the internal track of the football oval. From blocks of rocks and minerals and plenty of slabs from all over Australia, those into lapidary were stocking up. There were some great fossils that had been found along the shoreline in Victoria and South Australia and others from around the world. The Broken Hill mines were well represented as were the various opals and gemstones. The local lapidarists were also there to sell their excess and to pick up something more unusual for themselves.

There was not too much spare time for Warren Keedle, the manager of the Age of Fishes Museum in Canowindra, who travelled to Lithgow for the long weekend. He put on a special display of the fossilised ancient fish of the Devonian era found near their town which had a museum set up in 1998. Warren also had several models of the fish

themselves, along with casts of some of the 360-370 million year old fossil deposits. These fish appeared long before the dinosaurs when strange freshwater ancient fish with armour shells, others with lungs, teamed in the mighty rivers and creeks of the Central West. Other enormous killers, with jaws like crocodiles, were also located at Canowindra. Many children were intrigued with the models of the various fish species and how different they look to current fish species.

The Jack Taylor Memorial Lecture was given by accustomed guest speaker Gary Sutherland and took place on Saturday morning at 11am in the Meeting Room. A good crowd was on hand to hear Gary's topic of "Why I collect Minerals - A 45 year Journey" which he illustrated profusely with magnificent and impressive specimens from his own collection.

The various GEMBOREE 2017 Princesses had been judged by the Presentation Evening to give out the trophies and perpetual shields. The Princess winners were Tiny Tots Princess Jessica Mace, the Junior Princess Annabelle Vazquez and Senior

Princess Jasmine Flavel, and all three were wearing their various 'gem' tiaras. The latest tiara was only completed weeks beforehand and is called the New South Wales Gem Council Tiara.

Barbara Try compared the Presentation Evening on the Saturday night assisted by Anette Clarke. In summing up Barbara said that the quality of the entries was very high and in a number of cases the points between entrants was extremely close. One to take out a major prize was Dave Radke, winner of the Tom Jenkins Perpetual Trophy for Open Champion Lapidary.

There were bus excursions to the glow-worm tunnel at Newnes Junction on Good Friday, to historic Hill End and History Hill, and to the Mount Tomah Botanic Gardens, a 28-hectare public botanic coolclimate garden located in the Blue Mountains. Some sightseers saw the famous 'dinosaur tree', the other

name for the Wollemi pine, once thought extinct. The tree was discovered in 1994, deep in a gorge in the Wollemi National Park. The bus outing on Easter Monday visited Abercrombie House in Bathurst, returning to Lithgow via Sofala, Ilford and Capertee.

The Field Trips were successful with some reasonable finds. The Saturday trip saw participants using their gold panning skills, or lack of them, on the famous Turon River at Sofala. Sunday saw another convoy which headed for Oberon in search of sapphires.

Easter Sunday saw many on the showground enjoying a complimentary breakfast with the Lithgow Lions Club feeding the throng. It was also the day that the chocolate Easter eggs were given away. The GEMBOREE Easter Bilby made her annual appearance at the Sunday breakfast. Carrying a basketful of Easter eggs

meant she was keenly sought after. The Easter Bonnet parade added to the atmosphere of the special Sunday breakfast.

Two stalwarts in the lapidary field in New South Wales and of the various GEMBOREES and the GEMKHANAS are Kathy Selwood from Orange and Nelson Robertson. Both were again on hand doing assorted demonstrations almost continuously. Both are keen to show other lapidary members and the general public their artistic ability and the methods to create something to be proud of.

The Raffle started off with about seven prizes and ended up having over twenty-one. It was a great success with many appreciative winners. The Committee is very grateful to all who donated the many prizes, showing the great variety
