# Message to all Competitors & Judges Re Wire Wrapping

At the AFLACA J & R Meeting in Ballarat there was a discussion on Wire Wrapping, and there appears to be some confusion as to what is wire wrapping and what materials can be used to wrap said lapidary, fossil or mineral items.

In 2002 Wire Wrapping was introduced to the Lapidary Clubs of Australia and was approved to be included in the Competitor & Judging Manual. This was to assist members who could not solder but still wished to wear their cut gemstones. Please do not assume that wire wrapping involves merely wrapping wire around a stone. This is not the case as it still includes a range of techniques, including sawing, filing, annealing, sanding & polishing.

Over the years there have been a few changes to what is allowed. To clarify what is and is not allowed please read the explanations that follow.

- There are only three sections that relate to wire wrapping. They are 18E, 18F and 24G, these are listed on page 66 and page 76 of the current manual.
- Section 18E is Wire Wrapped jewellery with Lapidary, Fossil or Mineral Item/s prepared and set by entrant.
- Section 18F is Wire Wrapped Jewellery with Commercial Lapidary Item/s set by entrant.
- Section 24G is Enamelled Jewellery in Wire Wrapped Setting.

If a competitor submits a wire wrapped bracelet that does not contains any lapidary items – it is NOT eligible as it is missing the most important item i.e. the natural lapidary material, natural organic material, fossil, mineral or enamelled item.

The second most important thing is what wire is used to wrap the Lapidary item, DO NOT use **Jewellery wire**. This is an alloy and is coated and your entry will be disqualified. Use gold, silver, copper, brass or gold-filled wire.

Beads that are Natural lapidary material or Natural Organic material are allowed as long as they purely complement the main item(s) and must NOT dominate. This also means that silver beads are not allowed. To stop getting into trouble with this rule keep the beads as small as possible, and do not use too many.




# a/ CONTACT or THERMAL

Intrusion of magma into country rock. The rocks do not melt, but elements rearrange to form new minerals.


